We're all happy to see Spring after what turned out to be a very busy year for our Library! Compared to last year, we answered more reference questions, loaned more materials and involved twice as many students in library instruction.

Keyano moved into the new multiplex in Fort Chipewyan in the fall, which meant both expanded space and programming. To support this growth, the Library received funding to establish a core collection at this campus. Resources were identified and ordered, and are now being received, catalogued and processed before sending on to Fort Chip.

Another new initiative that we are excited about is the Centre for Entrepreneurship. This is the fourth such Centre to be established in Alberta and is scheduled to open at the end of August. We are participating in this project by acquiring, cataloguing, and processing the resources for the Centre's library.

Canadian Job Strategies sponsored two students in a seventeen week Library Aide/Instructor Aide programme at Keyano. These students are not only acquiring clerical skills but are also spending time daily with us learning about the many facets of libraries. The objective is to give them some basic training so they may return to their communities more adequately equipped to find employment with Northland School Division in their local schools.

ENVOY is now a fact of life in our Library. It's being used for interlibrary loan requests (address is ILL.AFMK) and for sending orders to Coutts. Our other new ENVOY address is KEYANO.LIBRARY so please "talk" to us anytime!

This summer we are going to make one more move and add the <u>last</u> possible stacks to our reference and circulating collections. As in so many other libraries, lack of space is becoming a serious problem.

As a result of the relocation of the English as a Second Language (ESL) Department to larger off-site quarters, the LRC/Library opened a new "branch". It is staffed by a library technician and a clerk. We are now in the process of cataloging the new collection of approximately 5000 items.

Some progress is being made toward automating our catalog (Ocelot software received!). As a summer project, we will begin inputting our catalog records. As we proceed, the collection will also be evaluated.

Over the past school term, we have had the opportunity of accepting four work experience students from the Business Careers program as well as a student volunteer and a field placement library technician from Grant MacEwan. These placements proved to be mutually beneficial as the students were offered a variety of experiences and we were able to complete 'extra' projects.

Our library instruction/orientation sessions continued to increase in numbers and diversity. We have been fortunate in having 'great' public relations with the academic staff and appreciate being consulted and given the opportunity to try a variety of presentations - very much a 'team' approach.

NAIT Library has just experienced a record breaking year of activity. During the period July 1986 to April 1987, circulation in the Main Library increased by 17% and user assistance increased by 34%, compared to the same period the previous year. Staff were hard pressed but survived the challenge!

A "Bucks for Books" campaign was launched recently with the distribution of promotional brochures to students and staff. We anticipate that matching grants received from the Alberta Endowment and Incentive Fund for the book donations will be applied towards library automation.

The Library is now using Envoy 100 (NAIT. Lib) to obtain interlibrary loans from the University of Alberta. Previously, a NAIT staff member retrieved books from the University of Alberta twice weekly, borrowing the books through regular circulation procedures.

The SUNWAPTA Record Collection consists of approximately fifteen thousand original 78, 45, and 33 rpm records from the 1920's to the 1950's. Donated by Dr. G. R. A. Rice of CFRN (Sunwapta Broadcasting), many of the records were actually from CFRN Radio's original working collection. These records are housed as a special collection at the Jasper Place Learning Resources Centre and are accessible on the ULISYS on-line public catalogue. Since the collection is an archival one, only cassette copies will be lent for a period of one week. Contact John McGrath or Pat Lloyd at 483-4415 for further information.

The Learning Skills Centres and the Learner Centres, which recently became part of the LRC, have been heavily used by the students. A common question amongst the LRC staff is 'how can I get more micro's for my learner centre?'

The on-line media catalogue is in the last stages of production. All audio-visual materials in the collection had their subject headings duplicated with the format in front, eg. a videorecording with the heading 'Canada - History' had an additional heading of 'Videorecording - Canada - History'. Thus, it will shortly be possible to answer the question of 'what videorecordings do you have on ...'?

Southern Alberta Institute of Technology

Our OPAC is up and are we enthusiastic! All the time spent worrying about teaching users has proved to be unnecessary in most cases. The morning it arrived students started using it and ignoring the cards. Refinements will come later as will total integration with Circulation, Remote access here we come!

SAIT's library is actively participating in a partnership with a nearby elementary-junior high school (Rosedale). Activities to date have included use of athletic and computer facilities, library instruction and issuing of borrower cards to the school and a very successful Student-for-a-Day whereby the entire school spent a half day touring and using our campus centre.

Our workbook is being prepared in a Computer Managed Learning (CML) version for students taking courses in that format for the fall.

He have completed a small survey of off-campus students and their instructors to see what they perceive as library needs. Tabulation and follow-up planned for the near future.

Our Audiovisual Department will be undergoing a major renovation soon with our playback facility (campus-wide service) coming to that area from eacher floor.

Once again we have to report changes on our staff. Anita Luck joined us the end of April, replacing Carol Fowler, in our classifying department. Gloria Chorney, previously in the audio visual department, has returned to the library to take care of ordering audio visuals and computer softwareand various other duties. After sixteen years as head librarian, Olive Lancaster has tendered her resignation and is heading for a well-deserved retirement. We will certainly miss her guiding hand. Truly, the place will not be the same without her.

Last fall, the computers that were located in the library, were moved to the C. M. L. lab. This not only helped to make the library a much quieter place to work, but eliminated endless requests for help that could not be satisfactorily handled by the "non-computer-expert" librarians.

As usual, we are looking forward to the summer and hoping to get some of our backlog caught up, with the help of summer students. By fall we will have a new computerized classification and circulation system installed and operating.



CANADIAN UNION COLLEGE

In February we added Bibliofile (The MARC data-base on CD-ROM) to our previous Bib-Base program. It came with a special program module from Small Library Computing which has several excellent features. One of these is a merge feature which allows us to locate a MARC record on the disk, then add it to our own data-base and merge it with any previously created record of our own. This enables us to preserve important budget and acquisitions information while taking complete advantage of the MARC cataloguing data.

Although we have only had Bibliofile for three months, we are already enjoying the substantial benefits in terms of time saved and improved quality of our cataloguing. As we select books or receive faculty requests for purchase, we locate the appropriate MARC record from Bibliofile and transfer it to our disk for ordering. Only minor changes are later required for the production of catalogue cards and labels.

Our original cataloguing has been further reduced this year through the use of DOBIS searching, both for inter-library loans and cataloguing of items which are not in Bibliofile.

After a record-breaking year in acquisitions and cataloguing, the summer is shaping up to be a busy time as we employ two students on STEP grants to assist with reclassification of older materials from the Dewey collection. A trip to Vancouver for the CLA Conference will help to break the monotony!

BiblioFile arrived in November and it has been generating a lot of excitement here. Our Data Center is in the process of getting all the equipment assembled for the various functions we want BiblioFile to perform for us, such as making card sets, book cards and pockets, and spine labels as well as giving us electronic bibliographic records. At the same time we have a STEP position approved to go all summer to convert records. We hope to employ a library technician. We are in the process of considering bar code labels. We have already talked with suppliers, other libraries, etc. and a plan is formulating in our minds.

Our Canada Works native bibliography project ended in December. Since that time we have been researching which items are available for purchase and filling out order slips to start buying them.

We have two workshops planned in May for off-campus instructors who recieved a mini-reference collection from us this fall. During the workshop we will explain what items are in the collection and how they work. We will also be discussing what other services the library can provide such as recent acquisition lists, data base searches, ILL's, a library orientation videotape, tours, etc. At both the workshops(one on campus, the other at Pincher Creek) we will work from the mini collections and get participants to use the card catalogues we will have set up for them.

We have a Canadian Jobs Strategy project employee working with us until July. She has worked on pathfinders and is no_{W} at the Circulation Desk and will be moving on to Technical Services in May.

News from CTCL includes a really exciting day for college librarians planned for CLA, the striking of a subcommittee on standards, a role statement from the librarians at Vancouver Community College further to CACUL's draft policy statement on "The Role of Academic Librarians". Directory sales are slow so if you are considering buying a copy, now is the time. We need your support! Actually people who have bought the directory find it invaluable. We will have a copy for you to peruse at CTCL Day at CLA. Also, through CTCL we have been contacted by an Australian librarian interested in an exchange. News of her arrangements will be mentioned elsewhere in this newsletter and in the CTCL Spring Communiqué. CTCL needs a spokesperson at CTCL day to highlight what is happening in the Alberta College Library scene for the round table reports in the afternoon. I need a volunteer please.
