

#### **WORKSHOP SUMMARY**

Kristine Plastow from Red Deer College demonstrated their staff blog, or "Chatalogue". Using an open source software from Geeklog, the RDC library staff are piloting a one year trial in the use of an online information-sharing weblog. Daily library news, database updates, staff vacation times, computer issues and an archive are all located within the site (<a href="https://library.rdc.ab.ca">https://library.rdc.ab.ca</a>). Kristine provided details about staff buy in, the fairly extensive training issues, and the need for strong IT support in the areas of PHP and MySQL. Overall, it sounds like a very progressive solution to information sharing within the RDC library.

The Future of the OPAC was the title of the David Brown's presentation. He contrasted a number of new and exciting innovations in OPACs against the apparent stagnation of several OPAC vendors. Innovations are being developed by individuals employed by libraries, rather than with the venders themselves, and David demonstrated a number of home-made improvements and enhancements. #### **Information Literacy Awards**

With the ever growing awareness of information usage and assessment needs. Augustana has recognized Information Literacy as a vital area in which to educate our students. In 2001, we introduced 21 for-credit discipline-specific Information Literacy courses for students in Art, Biology, Chemistry, Crime and Community, Drama, Economics, English, Environmental Studies, French, Geography, German, History, Management, Music, Physical Education, Philosophy, Political Studies, Psychology, Religion, Scandinavian Studies, and Sociology. Since their implementation, our reference librarians have noticed a substantial increase in students' library skills. The same year, we held our first annual Information Literacy workshop. Not only has this workshop been a valuable experience for visiting librarians, but it has been helpful in educating our faculty in different skills and techniques pertaining to Information Literacy. This year, in order to further strengthen the recognition of Information Literacy on our campus, we have created two awards celebrating those who employ it with proficiency: one for a faculty member who supports, encourages, and demonstrates strong Information Literacy skills, and the other for a student who shows extensive, intelligent, and creative use of our library.

#### **Information Literacy DVD**

After being asked to prepare a multimedia presentation on Information Literacy for an upcoming conference, I thought it would be exciting to make a DVD outlining Information Literacy initiatives at Augustana. A major part of the DVD was to get a campus-wide response about the impact of our Information Literacy courses, our annual workshops, our Information Literacy assessment practices and our awards. We interviewed students, faculty, administration, and librarians. Altogether we had over 75 participants in this project! It has certainly been a challenge, but thanks to the immeasurable help and support of the Augustana community, we have recently finished and produced our final product. I look forward to presenting it this summer at the American Library Association (ALA) conference in New Orleans and LOEX of the West conference in Hawaii.

#### **Information Literacy Workshop**

Our 2005 annual Information Literacy workshop was a huge success, thanks to our fantastic speaker, Judith Peacock, who is the Information Literacy Coordinator at the Queensland University of Technology in Brisbane, Australia. The two day workshop received a very positive response from many participants, and the success makes us eager to host our 6<sup>th</sup> annual workshop on November 16<sup>th</sup>, 2006. At this upcoming workshop, Beth Dupuis, the Head of Instructional Services at the University of California in Berkeley, will speak on "Supporting Undergraduate Research Experiences." Registration for this workshop opens in August (www.augustana.ca/library/workshop).

#### People Logo

This spring we asked for student volunteers to assist us in the creation of an Augustana Information Literacy logo – made of people! We had a great turn out and now have a new visual identity for marketing. We have printed the "logo" on a 3'x8' sheet of paper so students can find themselves – lots of fun! This will be posted at the workshop in November.

During the past year we have been pleased to have participated in the University of Alberta Libraries' Academic Library Internship Program. It's been a busy spring at the Grant MacEwan College LRCs, with staffing changes, space and storage planning and technology initiatives.

After nineteen years as a Reference/Collections Librarian at the City Centre LRC, Brenda Duncan has retired. Brenda graduated from Rosary College, Illinois with her MLS in 1966. She went on to work at the Detroit Public Library and the University of Windsor. Brenda was fortunate enough to work in balmy Hawaii for 11 years, where she had to adjust to huge banana spiders and termites hiding among the books. 1980 brought Brenda to Edmonton, to the University of Alberta Herbert T. Coutts Education Library and finally on to Grant MacEwan. Retirement plans include using her reference skills to solve crossword puzzles, spending more time visiting friends and family, and

hanging out at bookstores and the public library. Brenda will be missed by her colleagues, fellow faculty and staff members and students.

In other staffing news, Shannon D'Agnone began a term position as Reference Librarian. Shannon attended the University of Western Ontario's Faculty of Information and Media Studies and previously worked at the Wetaskiwin Composite High School. Claudia Rodning, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin—Madison, is also in a new term position. Claudia previously worked at Concordia University College and the Coutts Library at the University of Alberta. City Centre LRC would also like to welcome back Valeen Gunn, who has returned to Grant MacEwan after an eight year absence. Welcome Shannon. Claudia and Valeen! In addition, the City Centre LRC has advertised four continuing librarian positions. The positions cover a variety of collections areas including the physical sciences, business, English, and history. Along with collections, the incumbents will be involved in reference and instruction. They will help to support the undergraduate degrees that will be offered by MacEwan, as degree operating money has recently been approved.

The degree operating money will allow the LRC to expand its collection, both print and electronic. Library staff are currently evaluating numerous databases, most of which are produced by EBSCO. These databases provide content on a variety of subject areas, including sociology, psychology, business and literature. On the print side, library staff members were busy this spring ordering a multitude of books. With the expected influx of materials and new students in the fall, the LRC is in need of more room. As a result, a survey was conducted to determine the space utilization and needs of students. Highlights from the survey include the reaffirmation of the importance of separated quiet and group work areas, more private group use rooms and a request for improved traffic control near the first floor service desks.

The student survey provided valuable feedback used in a preliminary space plan created this spring. The plan reflects changes to the layout of the City Centre LRC from 2006 up to 2011. Some of these changes include the relocation of the reference desk to the same floor as the circulation and technology help desks, to facilitate one-stop shopping for patrons. The print collection will be moved around as well. The main circulating collection, which is currently split between two floors, will be consolidated on one floor. Items that are not commonly used will be sent to a remote storage location. In addition, the reference

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collection will be moved to the same floor as the three service desks. Two computer labs will be created and utilized for librarian instruction, each seating forty students.

In technology news, the MacEwan Learning Technology Centre (LTC) has initiated a Hot Spot project, enabling students to access the Internet wirelessly from outside of the library or computer labs. There is one hotspot location at City Centre with others planned for South Campus and Centre for the Arts. For students without their own laptops, the LTC has a new "Laptop for Loan" project where for \$5.00 a day, students can book one of the PC or MAC laptops for up to 5 days. Stay tuned for more exciting initiatives at MacEwan!

Medicine Hat College Library staff are all geared up for a busy Spring/Summer to get everything in place for a new BEd degree on campus. This is a collaborative effort between the Medicine Hat College and the University of Alberta with rural elementary focus and is going to start right at the beginning of the coming Fall semester. The ceremony was great with speeches from the college's president and the city's mayor, soft music, tasty food and a little chatting. The stress is really up though because we actually have to get things done before September! Lots of issues need to be taken care of and decisions made. The Service Achievement award was to acknowledge her being innovative at initiating and organizing a city-wide One Book One Community event for the past two years and also being an excellent instructional and marketing librarian. The One Book One Community event was a huge

success and the third one is on the way. So stay tuned!

Keith Walker, the director of the Library Services, was elected as the Chair of The Alberta Library and is running for the Chair of the Community and Technical College Libraries. He joked that he has lots of campaign managers but hey, why not! A strong voice from Alberta will certainly lead the Alberta and Canadian college library community to a brighter future!

Music scores! Are we done yet? Well sort of. In early May, the Library staff celebrated the milestone of finishing cataloguing all the existing records, which counts over 3000. # Mount Royal College

Personnel – (a) Librarians – We have just completed the hiring process for two tenure-track librarian vacancies. One is a new position in the 2006-07 budget, and the other results from lan Watt's retirement last fall. The successful candidates are Michelle Sinotte (from U of C) and Alice Swabey (who has been on a term-certain contract at MRC Library this past year).

The Library has obtained approval to establish a faculty chair position effective Fall 2006. Janet Monteith has been appointed Library Chair for a three-year term.

Brad Neufeldt, who has been with us on contract since January, has just been appointed College Librarian at St. Mary's University College. (b) Library Support Staff – Our Serials Technician, Marilyn Cox, is retiring in June after 26 years at MRC Library. Access Services Desk Technician Theresa Remtulla will be going on maternity leave in July. We are in the process of recruiting their replacements. We also have budget approval for a new Tech Services Technician position in 2006-07.

<u>Library Technology</u> – (a) Our Endeavor Voyager library system is being moved to a larger server in May, in preparation for a system upgrade in June. (b) The College is converting all networked printers from SmartCard (cash card) to a Pcounter (network debit account) system, and the Library's printers have now implemented Pcounter.

Library Transition Implementation Committee (LTIC) – To sustain the momentum of the MRC Library Transition Task Force (LTTF) report that was completed last summer, we established a committee to oversee the implementation of some of the LTTF report's recommendations. LTIC hired a senior student from Public Relations, Robin Boschman, for the winter semester to conduct several student focus groups and an internal/external library communication audit. Robin was ably assisted by librarian Peggy French in these projects. An LTIC report has now been drafted for consideration by Library Council at our spring planning day on May 26.

New Degree Proposals – Mount Royal has submitted several proposals for new degrees to Alberta Advanced Education. The first of these, a Bachelor of Nursing, has been approved, which triggers an institutional review by the Quality Council. The Library contributed to the self-study document that MRC has prepared for the QC review team. A site visit has been scheduled for June 12-13.

Professional Development Activities – In April Library Director Ross Thrasher was a delegate at the Chair Academy Conference in Tucson, Arizona, and Library System Administrator Alan Waugh attended the Endeavor End User conference in Chicago. In May librarians Pearl Herscovitch and Margot Millard attended the WILU (Info Lit) conference in Wolfville, N.S. Margy MacMillan and Meagan Weber have both been invited to give papers at another information literacy conference, LOEX of the West, in Hawaii in June. # NAIT Library Submitted by Helga Kinnaird

- Fairview Campus Library staff collected 195
  lbs of food for the Student's Association
  Food Bank thanks to the generous NAIT
  staff and students who dropped off food in
  support of students in need.
- On January 26<sup>th</sup> McNally Library held a very successful open house for students and staff to showcase the "new look" as well as highlight some Library's services available both in person and online.
- Beginning on March 1<sup>st</sup>, NAIT Libraries staff piloted the use of Instant Messaging to provide real-time reference service to students and staff. The pilot demonstrated that IM complements existing in-person, phone and email library services; it can be added at very low cost; and it will help library staff develop strong virtual reference relationships with students and staff. Hours for IM were expanded and the service declared permanent on May 1<sup>st</sup>. Isobel Rancier and Harriet Arnold are giving a presentation about this project at the Association of Canadian Community Colleges Conference in Calgary in May.
- Diane Clark has been seconded to the University of Alberta Library from April 2006 to April 2007. Isobel Rancier is acting as Supervisor Information Literacy Instruction during this period.
- Thin client computers are now available to students in public spaces on satellite campuses in Edmonton and in the northwest. Advanced Education provided the funding for the equipment as a grant for an applied research project to test collaborative server-based computing and to expand use of the SuperNet. Because these thin client computers are located in public spaces, students are able to access Library resources, the Student Portal, and the internet anytime the buildings are open. Staff is gathering data on whether this approach achieves greater efficiency, lower cost, and an easier way to use technology in learning.
- Preparations are underway to merge NAIT Libraries two online catalogues in July.

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This is the final step to complete the merger of the NAIT and Fairview libraries.

Diane Clark, together with Kathy Cocchio (a NAIT School of Business instructor), will receive the CTCL Innovation award during the Canadian Library Association Conference in June. This award is for a WebCT course intended for use by NAIT staff - TCI 320: Academic Integrity: Defining It, Building It, Teaching It and Keeping It. The purpose of this online project was to address issues of academic integrity through providing access to learning or training, to establish a learning community where participants can share their teaching experiences, to promote information literacy competencies, and to work collaboratively with teaching faculty. TCI 320 is a selfpaced, stand alone online module that demonstrates best practices in instructional design through engaging the learner (faculty) through multimedia, content and learning activities and creating a community of learners via discussion and shared experiences.

This online module/workshop was designed to provide teaching faculty with the necessary tools to address academic integrity. The module has five objectives

- Defining key terms
- 2. Understanding student attitudes towards plagiarism
- Regulating academic integrity at NAIT
- 4. Deterring, detecting and responding to plagiarism
- Understanding copyright in online learning

Note: In addition to the described workshop above there is an accompanying academic integrity module for students (one for APA and one for MLA); this was not submitted for this award.

Benefits to the NAIT Libraries are supporting and promoting student success through the reduction or elimination of plagiarism. A co-benefit is the promotion of the library and its services to the NAIT community. Collaborating with teaching faculty through curriculum development visà-vis embedding information literacy competencies into the classroom is an integral component of achieving student success.

### Olds College

Hot May afternoons make working or even thinking (those two are probably connected) darn hard. But here goes. If this report stops in mid-sentence, you will know I have broken out of the Library into the great outdoors.

I think summer + library = renovations in nearly every library. The ink was barely dry on the last student exam before Campus Facilities flew into the Library with their hammers, saws, paintbrushes, screwdrivers and plastic sheeting. We're expanding the Information Commons and reorienting the layout of the computers to better facilitate teaching. So, the meeting room next door was sacrificed but it was a worthwhile surrender since the enlarged room is much brighter and more functional.

Library staff saw Campus facility staff having so much fun with their tools that they got out their own. Carrels have always been underutilized here so staff removed the partitions between some of the double carrels to expand the student's work surface. If the usage of these carrels increases, more sawing might take place.

Book trucks have also been crisscrossing the Library at high speed. To replace the meeting room demolished in the expansion of the Information Commons, the videos were moved out of another room into the open stacks. The collection was heavily weeded and these have now been made available for circulation to students. After much discussion, faculty can place videos that are heavily used by their students on permanent reserve.

Conference season is another part of springtime activities. Numerous staff attended various conferences such as WILU and AALT. I attended the ARLIS pre-conference workshop on Copyright that was held at the Banff Springs in early May. Both Christine Sammon and James Rout need a pat on the back for helping organize that session (and getting great rates at the Fairmont Banff Springs). Wanda Noel, an Ottawa copyright lawyer, conducted the session and for the first time I think I understood it or most of it (but no questions please!). She was really clear about the principles upon which she was basing her answers. If you get a chance to hear her....

The groundbreaking for the first new building to be constructed as part of the Community Learning

Campus (CLC) will take place on May 24<sup>th</sup>. This is the e-Learning Core located in the same overall complex as the Library. The new facility will have multiple functions including providing opportunities for distance learning, promoting rural access to high speed internet through the Supernet and access for remote learners, and reducing technology tool/resource redundancy between Olds College and Chinook's Edge School division. In a nutshell, think computer technology and all that involves. In this evolutionary process, we are also continuing discussions on how to best merge the libraries of the College and High School.

That's it, I think, for news from this part of the library world.

#### **Red Deer College**

Lots of internal changes at RDC Library these past months. The College went through a reorganization last year, and the Library became part of the new Division of Learning Resources through that process. Other units in the Division are the Teaching Learning Technology Centre (an area to assist faculty with technology or with learning design) and the Computer Learning Lab. Our Library Chair, Alice McNair, has become the Interim Manager of this new Division. Her place as leader of the Library was taken by Maureen Toews, who has become Library Team Leader.

Over the past year, these organizational changes have not had much effect on our day-to-day life in the Library, other than the fact that we're short-staffed because they have not back-filled for Maureen, who is back-filling for Alice. But now the changes are really starting in earnest. The four TLTC staff are moving into the Library, along with their specialized multimedia equipment. We are also welcoming the two staff who work in the Faculty Animateur's office — this is a College-wide office which coordinates professional development for all faculty.

So, where do we put six more people and more computers without taking space away from students? That's been the challenge of the space planning people, and they have come up with plans to convert some one-person offices into two-person offices, and to renovate some underutilized spaces (like the microfilm room!) to turn them into offices. The issue we have been most vocal about is that we cannot lose any student spaces, including group study rooms and open study spaces. Things will be

exciting around here as we fit these six people into our space over the summer.

Speaking of student spaces, we conducted a survey of the usage of our group study rooms from February to April. Our library has 12 group study rooms, six of which are equipped with computers. We also have one dedicated quiet study room, which can accommodate up to ten people studying at individual carrels.

During the survey period, staff counted people in each room every hour that the library was open. While the results have not been fully analysed yet, there are some patterns emerging from the data. One pattern is that the group rooms with computers are used more often than the ones without computers. However, all rooms are used consistently, with peak times generally being weekdays from 10 AM to 4 PM. Also, the group rooms are used primarily by groups rather than by individuals. While this was always the intention of those rooms, we were not sure that this was the way they were in fact being used.

Students have consistently identified noise in the library as an area of concern and the quiet study room is available for these learners. However, the stats are showing that the quiet study room is not well used. Our sense is that, although students are asking for the quiet study space, they generally want to be in the thick of things in the main part of the library, rather than in a quiet study space. The full survey results will be available in July.

This week we are launching our "IM a Librarian" service – an instant messaging reference service. For the pilot project over the summer we will offer IM service 9-5 weekdays. We decided to go ahead with our pilot project this summer to prepare us for the arrival of the AAQ IM service, which will probably be launched in the fall. This way, our staff will be more comfortable with IM when our busy period comes next fall, and we'll have one less thing to learn! Details on our IM service are available on our website.

### **SAIT Library**

#### **New Staff**

The Library has added two new staff to help handle its expanded service hours and its growing and diversifying information resources that include more E-Resources such as electronic books. Audrey Farch, Library Technician, and SAIT LIT grad, joined the Library in September and will be working

evenings and weekends at the Information Desk. Kat Johnston has filled the new instructional librarian position. Kat brings a wealth of classroom and web application instructional experience obtained during her work at Grant MacEwan Community College and University of Alberta libraries.

Kristian McInnis, one of our sessional evening/weekend staff, is currently working as the cover off for Michelle Racine who is on maternity leave until the summer of 2006.

#### **Exhibits**

The SAIT Library hosted its first ever SAIT staff artwork exhibit from November 14 to December 16. Fourteen instructors and staff from six departments displayed photographs, wood sculptures, fabric art, paintings, blown glasswork and mechanical sculptures.

#### **Library Renovations**

Lowering shelving to many 1.5 meters and reorienting some high 2 meter shelving have improved sight lines across the library and to windows on both floors. To improve circulation and in-library use, the English as a Second Language and Children's Literature collections were pulled from the main circulating shelves and given dedicated shelving.

Planning is underway to incorporate approximately 300 square meters of space adjacent to the library entrance into desktop/laptop access space. This renovation will necessitate two new sets of library doors, a new library information desk, and new book drop, plus workstations, a printer, a photocopier and a print release station.

#### Wireless Access in the Library

The SAIT Library has installed wireless technology. This service is designed to match laptops leased by SAIT students from the Information Systems Department. Non-compatible personal laptop wireless access has not been a high priority for the SAIT Information Systems Department. However, they do acknowledge that personal laptop use is growing on campus and will require greater support in the future.
