- Residents are assigned to work on a major project in collaboration with librarians working outside of their home unit

Focus: The communications and outreach recommendations arising from the report *Supporting International Students: The University of Alberta Libraries' Response to the University Strategic Plan* (2017)

Project Background

- Report: Extensive study of library services
 - Review of current literature
 - Site visits to university libraries across Canada and in England
 - Interviews with UAlberta international students, faculty, staff, and senior leadership of the Faculty of Graduate Studies and Research

Interview Questions for Librarians

- Are there any specific programs and services designed for international students?
- Does the library have a formal liaison relationship with the International Centre or equivalent at your institution?
- What are your priorities in serving international students?
- Do you offer or do you have plans to offer intercultural training and development to library staff?

Highlights of the Findings

- 29 recommendations aligned to current strategic directions for consideration at UAL
- Suggested next steps for
 - improving existing services, and prioritizing and implementing sustainable and impactful actions that utilize existing best practices in library services for international students
 - developing new initiatives to improve the library user experience for international students

Key Recommendations

- 1. Send out a call for expressions of interest for three formal library liaison positions with specific responsibility to the International Student Centre.
- 2. Develop a comprehensive and integrated communications strategy focused on international students in partnership with liaison librarians.
- 3. Develop and deliver staff training to increase awareness and improve services for international students.

Expected Outcomes


- 1. Improved/integrated library services and communication with international students and the International Student Centre.
- 2. Strategic ongoing and sustainable communication regarding library resources and services for international students.

Communications Plan

- An articulated strategy for library communications to international students
- A detailed outline of
 - the activities and specific recommendations that will be planned, executed, and evaluated
 - our mission, our audience, key messages, and benchmarks
- Working draft completed January 2019


The UAlberta Context: The Big Picture

Student Population by Home Address




The UAlberta Context: Undergraduate






